Rules and Regulations for Exhibitors at the Stoughton Fair

IMPORTANT: Please read these regulations carefully!

- 1. Departments 1 through 27 are open to any member in good standing with youth organizations such as FFA, FHA, 4-H, Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts. You must be a member of a youth organization to exhibit. All exhibitors will follow the 4-H age to exhibit in all the departments.
- 1a. DEFINITIONS: Clover Buds will NOT be allowed to exhibit in Departments 1 Dairy, 2 Beef, 3 Swine, 4 Sheep, 5 Goats, and 6 -Horse and Pony for reasons of safety.
- 2. All items exhibited must be the result of the exhibitor's project work for the exhibit year.
- 3. All exhibitors must be up to date with project requirements to be eligible for participation at the fair.
- 4. All exhibits must be in place by 9:00 p.m. Wednesday and remain until 6:00 p.m. SUNDAY, PLEASE PICK UP PREMIUMS BEFORE YOU LEAVE THE GROUNDS ON SUNDAY, PREMIUMS MAILED WILL BE ASSESSED A \$ 1.00 HANDLING CHARGE.
- 5. All entries must be submitted on regular entry blanks to the Secretary, postmarked no later than May 31. Late entries will not be processed. Please check entry tags when you receive them to make sure they correspond with the entries you made. No additional entries or changes will be made after JUNE 20, 2014.
- 6. Vocational instructors and club leaders are responsible for all entries of exhibitors from their organizations.
- 7. Each exhibitor is limited to one entry per lot. Check individual departments for their entry limits.
- 8. All livestock exhibitors are required to furnish feed, water, and bedding as well as feed/water containers for their animals. Any exhibitor who does not properly care for their livestock while at the fair, will have necessary costs charged to them. Livestock exhibitors must keep their stalls open and their stock uncovered between the hours of 9:00 a.m. and 9:00 p.m. during each day of the fair. Unloading/loading of livestock will be permitted in designated areas only. Check with superintendents for more information.
- 8a. Livestock exhibits must be shown by the exhibitor unless special arrangements are made with the superintendents.
- 8b. ATTENTION HORSE EXHIBITORS: Each horse and pony exhibitor must provide a refundable deposit of ten dollars (\$10.00) with the registration forms made payable to the Stoughton Fair. The deposit will be returned PRIOR to the exhibitor leaving the fairgrounds with the animal and trailer, provided the animal refuse and parking site is cleaned up and INSPECTED. Any forfeiture or failure to request refunds will be applied to the general funds for improving the fairgrounds. DEADLINE TO REQUEST REFUND IF NOT SHOWING IS 8:00 AM DAY OF SHOW.
- 8c. ALL LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS: Dairy, Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Rabbits and Poultry manure waste will be collected in manure spreaders each day. Exhibitors are asked to cooperate with keeping cans and other waste out of the spreaders. Before leaving the fairgrounds each exhibitor is required to clean out their pens, stalls or cages.
- 9. ALL ENTRIES ARE EXHIBITED AT THE EXHIBITOR'S RISK. The Stoughton Fair Association will take responsible precautions but will not be responsible for damages, loss or theft.

 Uniformed Police will be on the grounds day and night to preserve order and protect property.
- 10. All departments will be judged on the Danish or group basis.

- 11. Premiums will not be awarded to unworthy exhibits or those indicating misrepresentation.
- 12. Any exhibitor, or friend/relative of exhibitor who interferes with any judge or superintendent in their work in any way, will cause the exhibits of said exhibitor to be disqualified from receiving any award or prize.
- 13. Any person who violates any of these rules will forfeit all privileges and premiums, and be subject to such penalties as the Fair Board may order.
- 14. Any emergency not provided for in these rules shall be referred to the Fair Board and their decision shall be final.

Wisconsin County, District & State Fairs 2014 Animal Health Rules And Regulations

SUMMARY

This is a summary of animal health requirements for fairs, shows and exhibitions only. They are not necessarily the same as requirements for importing animals into Wisconsin or moving them within the state for other purposes. They may change if animal diseases occur in Wisconsin or elsewhere, so you should always check our website or contact us for current information.

General Requirements for show organizers

Fairs or exhibitions lasting more than 24 hours must appoint a licensed veterinarian to inspect all livestock daily

Fairs or exhibitions lasting less than 24 hours must have a licensed veterinarian or show chairperson review all required records and test results to check for:

- Exhibitor's name and address
- · Animal identification (number, type, description)
- Compliance with disease testing and other health requirements
- · Livestock premises number, if any, where animals originated

Fair management must maintain records for 5 years of:

- Exhibitors
- · Livestock premises numbers, if any
- Animal identification

Diseases

Animals that show evidence of having contagious or infectious diseases may be removed immediately, and may be quarantined or slaughtered.

Bovine animals with ringworm, mange or scab will be removed from the fair or exhibition premises, unless the veterinarian in charge finds they are incapable of transmitting disease.

Cattle and Bison

Cattle from within Wisconsin have no requirements for tests or health documents.

Cattle from outside Wisconsin must:

- Be accompanied by certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) documenting official animal ID and all required tests and certifications
- Have at least one form of official individual ID (including steers)
- Meet all of Wisconsin's normal requirements for import (see http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Cattle_Bison)
 Acceptable animal IDs for all cattle from outside Wisconsin
- USDA metal ear tag number that is part of the National Uniform Eartagging System (NUES) (starts with state 2-digit code, also known as "brite" tag)
- 15-digit "840" tags (visual or RFID)

- Manufacturer-coded RFID tag 15-digit number with the first three digits in 900s
- American ID tag 8 to 12-digit number prefaced with "USA"

Brucellosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

- · Steers are exempt from any brucellosis test requirement
- Cattle from brucellosis-free states are exempt from brucellosis testing requirement
- Cattle from certified brucellosis-free herds in Class A states do not need brucellosis tests if the CVI has the certified herd number and the last test date
- All other cattle need negative brucellosis test within 30 days before entering Wisconsin

Tuberculosis requirements for cattle from outside Wisconsin

Negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin are required for cattle if they originate from:

- States or zones that are Modified Accredited Advanced states or that Wisconsin treats as MAA because they have had bovine TR cases
- Modified Accredited states (see section below for Michigan's Modified Accredited and Modified Accredited Advanced zones)
- States that do not recognize Wisconsin's TB-free status
- For requirements by state: http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Cattle_Bison

Cattle from Michigan's TB Free Zone:

- Need negative individual TB test within 60 days before arrival in Wisconsin for all animals
- · Whole herd TB test and import permit not required

Cattle from Michigan's MA and MAA zones and other states with MA zones:

- · Need import permits
- Need negative whole-herd TB tests within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin for all animals 1 year and older
- Need negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- Must return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

Cattle from Canada must meet current federal requirements to enter the United States. (See http://www.aphis.usda.gov/import_export/downloads/pro_imp_cattle-bison_can.pdf) For information on obtaining an import permit:

Swine

Swine from within Wisconsin need a Wisconsin intrastate movement certificate:

- Stating that the herd of origin was inspected on the farm within 30 days before the show and showed no signs of disease
- Including documentation of all required tests

Swine from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection that includes the following: a statement that they have not received pseudorabies vaccinations, a statement of the PRRS status of the herd of origin (if known), and official identification number.

Acceptable methods of ID for swine are:

- USDA silver ear tag
- USDA 840 button ear tag
- Breed association tattoo
- An ear tag with the premises identification number and a unique identifier
- Ear notch (if the pig is a purebred and the notch is registered)
 Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Swine.

Sheep and Goats

Sheep and goats from within Wisconsin:

- If sexually intact, need official individual ID at any age
- If not sexually intact, need official individual ID if they are 12 months or older
- Official ID may be scrapie ear tags, USDA 840 button ear tag, or breed association tattoo (as long as it is unique to that animal)
- Cannot have been exposed to scrapie if they are sexually intact

Sheep and goats from outside Wisconsin:

- Need certificate of veterinary inspection and official individual ID: scrapie ear tag, USDA 840 button ear tag, or breed association tattoo (as long as it is unique to that animal)
- By federal rule, the CVI must also include: a statement by the issuing accredited or state or federal veterinarian that the animals were not exhibiting clinical signs associated with scrapie at the time of examination, an owner statement indicating whether the animal is or is not a scrapie-positive, suspect, high-risk or exposed animal and whether it originated in an infected, source, exposed, or noncompliant flock

Goats from Michigan's TB Modified Accredited Zone:

- Need import permits
- Need negative whole-herd TB tests within 12 months before arrival in Wisconsin
- Need negative individual TB tests within 60 days before entering Wisconsin
- Must return directly to the state of origin after the show, and there must be a statement on the CVI that they will be doing so

Equine

Equine animals from within Wisconsin need documentation of a negative EIA test done in 2014, which clearly identifies the animal by registration number, lip tattoo, freeze brand, or complete description. Documentation may be:

- · Official test report VS 10-11, or
- · USDA-approved electronic test form, or
- · Global Vet Link EIA electronic form, or
- Certificate of veterinary inspection with the test results listed

Equine animals from outside Wisconsin need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI)
- Negative EIA test done in 2014, which clearly identifies the animal by registration number, lip tattoo, freeze brand, or complete description, and reported on the CVI

Equines from Minnesota are exempt from the CVI requirement if:

- Ownership does not change while the animal is in Wisconsin
- The animal remains in Wisconsin no longer than 7 days
- Proof of an EIA test in the current calendar year (2014) accompanies the animal

Llamas, Alpacas, and Guanacos

Llamas, alpacas and guanacos from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Llamas, alpacas and guanacos from outside Wisconsin must have a certificate of veterinary inspection and official animal ID. Official ID may be:

- Approved USDA ear tag number
- Microchip number
- · Breed association registration number
- · Breed association tattoo

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Llamas Alpacas Guanacos.

Exotic Ruminants

Note: Exotic ruminants are ruminants that are not native to Wisconsin, and are not cervids – for example, vicuñas, camels, yaks, water buffalo, pronghorn antelope and giraffes.

Exotic ruminants from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Exotic ruminants from outside Wisconsin need an import permit and a certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI) with proof that they meet requirements for:

- Bovine TB negative test required within 60 days before entry
- Brucellosis negative test required within 30 days before entry Please call 608-224-4872 beforehand to determine which TB test to use.

Poultry and Waterfowl (Pigeons are not considered poultry for fairs and shows)

Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need:

Poultry and waterfowl from within Wisconsin need:

- A NPIP certificate stating that the birds originate from a US. pullorum-typhoid clean or NPIP affiliate flock, or
- A DATCP-issued certificate stating they are from a Wisconsin Tested or Associate Flock or
- Individually test sexually mature birds within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID. All birds must test negative for pullorum-typhoid, and turkeys must test negative for Mycoplasma gallisepticum.

Poultry and waterfowl from outside Wisconsin need a certificate of veterinary inspection or equivalent (such as form VS 9-3) that states:

- They originate from a flock classified pullorum-typhoid clean under NPIP or an equivalent state program, or
- If they are sexually mature, that they have tested negative for pullorum-typhoid (and Mycoplasma gallisepticum for turkeys) within 90 days before arrival at the show. These birds also need wing or leg band ID.

Not required:

• Import permit number

Exotic small animals Dogs, Domestic Cats, and other Household Pets (Ferrets, Pet Birds, Rabbits, Gerbils, Guinea Pigs, Hamsters, Domestic Mice and Rats)

Note: These rules do not apply to animals that are part of menageries. For those rules, see below. Pot-bellied and miniature pigs fall under rules for swine.

Dogs from within Wisconsin that are 5 months or older need proof of current rabies vaccination.

Cats and other household pets from within Wisconsin have no requirements.

Dogs and cats from outside Wisconsin that are 5 months or older need to be vaccinated for rabies by a licensed veterinarian, and regardless of age, need certificates of veterinary inspection stating the age of the animal and for animals 5 months and older the date of last rabies vaccination and revaccination due date

Other household pets from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection (CVIs) but have no testing or vaccination requirements.

Small animals from other nations need to meet requirements of the U.S. Department of Agriculture (608-662-0600) and Centers for Disease Control (1-800-232-4636).

Requirements are subject to change as conditions warrant. For current information, check http://datcp.wi.gov/Animals/Animal_Movement/Household Pets.

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin do not have any requirements as long as they are legally possessed in Wisconsin.

Animals from outside Wisconsin generally have no testing or vaccination requirements, but do need:

- Certificate of veterinary inspection (CVI)
- Import permit number

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin.

These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice.

Others may require permits from the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources. See http://dnr.wi.gov.

Circus, Rodeo, Racing and Menagerie Animals

Note: Local jurisdictions may have requirements beyond the state requirements listed here.

Animals from within Wisconsin must meet vaccination and testing requirements for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document.

Animals from outside Wisconsin need certificates of veterinary inspection and vaccinations and tests required for their species. See these requirements earlier in this document. They also need import permit numbers if they are:

- · Circuses and individual circus acts
- Rodeo stock other than individual participants' horses
- Multi-species menageries (defined as any animals kept in a collection primarily for purposes of exhibition or competition)
- Petting zoos

They do not need import permit numbers if they are:

- · Rodeo horses owned by individual participants
- · Single-species groups

Note: Some animals may not be brought to Wisconsin.

These are North American prairie dogs and the following African species: tree squirrels, rope squirrels, dormice, Gambian giant pouched rats, brush-tailed porcupines and striped mice. Others may require permits from the Department of Natural Resources. See http://dnr.wi.gov/org/land/wildlife/captive/captive.htm.

Guidelines for Housing and Managing Animals

The State Veterinarian recommends that exhibitors:

- Vaccinate breeding cattle against bovine viral diarrhea (BVD) at least 30 days before the event
- Test cattle for BVD-PI by immunoperoxidase test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Test cattle for Johne's disease test results by ELISA test, and bring them to shows only if they test negative
- Clean and disinfect vehicles used to transport animals to and from the show, and vehicles used at the show, before and after the show
- Isolate exhibited animals returning to their farms or animals purchased at the show for 21 days before mingling them with other stock

The State Veterinarian recommends that show organizers:

- House cattle separately from llamas, vicuñas, alpacas, guanacos, and other exotic ruminants
- House cattle separately from small ruminants, especially sheep
- House ostriches, emus, rheas and cassowaries separately from domestic poultry
- House swine separately from any other mammals
- Include a space for the premises registration code on livestock entry forms
- · Provide hand-washing stations near all livestock facilities
- Provide individual watering and feeding troughs rather than common ones

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS (IAFE) NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in the competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age or any facts relating thereto is prohibited. 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
 - Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drugs residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, and/or absolutely responsible person for the show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with the applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance in the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be the prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered of a licensed veterinarian.
- 5. Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

- The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct towards them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility of an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics. 10. of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11. The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

Judging Regulations

- 1. In no case shall any person who is an officer or director of a fair be eligible to judge exhibits at such fair, nor shall any person interested directly in exhibits shown in any department of a fair be eligible to judge articles or animals shown in that department.
- 2. No animal or article, irrespective of the number of entries in the lot in which it is entered, shall be awarded a higher rating than its merit would entitle it to in comparison to the standard of the perfection in the class.
- departments are judges according to the Danish system, 4 group placings must be awarded in any lot. When there are less that 8 exhibitors in the lot, there shall not be more than 2 in the first group, not more than 4 in the first two groups and not more than 6 in the first three groups. If there are 8 or more entries in the lot, there shall not be more that 25 percent in the first group, not more than that 50 percent in the first two groups, and not more than 75 percent in the first three groups. The number of awards in the last group placing may be increased to the extent necessary to give awards to all exhibitors.

Judges' Duties

- 1. No exhibitor shall act as a judge in the department in which they exhibit.
- 2. Any exhibitor attempting to influence the judge in their work, in any manner, shall forfeit all premiums awarded and will be excluded from further competition.
- 3. When the exhibits are not deemed worthy, the judge will refuse to award a premium whether there be competition or not.
- 4. When respectfully requested, the judges are expected to give reasons for their decisions; stating what constitute special points of excellence in the class of animals or articles being considered, and pointing out superiority of one over another.
- 5. Judges will make their report of awards to the superintendents in charge, properly sign judging sheets, and turn judging sheets into the secretary's office promptly after awards are made.

Duties of Fair Superintendents

- 1. Give judge recommendations to fair secretary. Fair secretary will send out contract.
- 2. Give suggestions for new superintendents to fair secretary.
- 3. Superintendents shall make suggestions for the improvement of their department to the fair board. Make suggestions for the premium book.
- 4. Fair Board will not reimburse for any dollar amount that is not approved by the fair board.
- 5. Sponsor names need to be submitted for fair board before contacting sponsors.
- 6. Set-up before the fair, help clean and arrange displays.
- 7. Superintendents need to be on duty in their department:
 - a. Entry day: 12:00noon 9:00pm
 - b. Judging Day: check time and day of judging
 - c. Release day: 5:30pm 8:00pm (any exhibits left after 8:00pm will be brought to office.)
 - d. LIVESTOCK: All livestock needs to be checked in when unloading. All animals shown at the Stoughton Fair must be identified and records must be kept with the fair secretary for 5 years. A livestock superintendent must be on duty from 12:00noon 9:00pm, or make arrangements for an assistant to be there. Contact fair secretary with changes.
- 8. Superintendents should aid all exhibitors in entering and displaying exhibits, and if so requested, assists judges in affixing ribbons, but must take no part in the judging itself. Assist the judge in completing the judge's sheets completely and accurately and turning them into the secretary's office when judging is finished.
- 9. After judging arrange exhibits in an attractive way. Check department daily.
- 10. In livestock areas make sure exhibitors are keeping pens clean and animals are fed and watered. NOTE: PLEASE SUPERVISE MANURE REMOVALAT RELEASE TIME. HELP WITH CLEAN-UP.
- 11. Horse exhibitors clean up on fair grounds and in park: Definition of Clean Up for refundable deposit:
 - a. All manure, hay, bedding, etc be picked up and removed.
 - b. Any holes made will be filled in
 - c. All litter properly disposed of.
 - d. This is a public park, leave it in the condition you are proud of.

Regulations

- 1. All dairy exhibits must be checked in between 12:00 noon and 9:00 p.m. Wednesday.
- All classes will be judged on the Danish or group basis.
- 3. All animals exhibited must be the result of regular 4-H, FFA, Junior Dairyman or Junior Holstein project work
- 4. Exhibitors must keep their areas clean during the fair. Areas cleaned often with manure being deposited in manure area by 8:30 a.m. An adequate bedding pack of no more than 62 should be maintained.
- 5. Exhibitors are required to clean areas at release time. Pitch manure to center. Follow superintendent's direction.
- Only one animal may be shown per class by an exhibitor. NO CLOVERBUDS.
- 7. Third and fourth graders may show spring, winter and fall calves. A yearling may be shown if the member has carried a dairy project the previous year.
- 8. No exhibitor may enter more than four (4) dairy animals except five (5) animals may be shown if the 5th one is a cow. Note: The dairy committee reserves the right to make stall assignments adjustments according to the number of animal actually present at the fair.
- 9. Registration papers will be checked on all purebred entries. Your leader or advisor will check these papers at a designated time and place with fair officials. The animal is to be registered in the name of the junior exhibitor or in the name of the junior exhibitor as co-owner except in the case of a managerial animal.
- 10. A managerial animal is an animal that is shown but not owned by the exhibitor.
- 11. All dairy and livestock projects must be started no later than May 1 of exhibit year.
- 12. All calves and yearlings must have been purchased by May 1 of exhibit year. All other aged animals must be purchased by January 1 of exhibit year.
- 13. Each club must have someone in charge of the exhibit at all times.
- 14. Exhibitors must bring their own feed and bedding. Shavings no longer available from fair.
- 15. Judging of dairy cattle will start with Showmanship lots at 9:00 a.m. Thursday. ENTRY TAGS ARE REQUIRED FOR SHOWMANSHIP. Judging of the Dairy Show will begin after Sr. Showmanship Thursday approximately 11:00 a.m.
- 16. Failure to follow any of the rules or regulations stated will result in an automatic fourth (pink) placement.
- 17. A congeniality award will be selected by the judge based on sportsmanship, showmanship and courtesy inside and outside the dairy show ring.

Show Order

The Breed order will be: Milking Shorthorn, Ayrshire, Jersey, Guernsey, Brown Swiss and Holstein.

The following describes the rules and regulations of the Stoughton Jr. Fair Meat Animal Sale.

GENERAL RULES

- 1. Auction entries will be due along with fair entries by the normal due date of May 31st. There will be a separate entry form that will be found on the fair website along with the regular forms. The animal that is to be sold does not need to be chosen until the start of the fair. The entry form is only to show that an exhibitor plans on selling.
- The meat animal sale is open to all exhibitors that show market animals. The sale is broken into 2 categories: large and small animals.
- 3. Each exhibitor may sell one lot in each category.
- 4. Each entry must be of a meat breed.
- 5. Each entry must be shown in the correct class.
- Each exhibitor must also show in the showmanship class for the species they are selling.
- 7. There will be a 15 lot/head limit for all species selling in the sale. If the number of potential sale animals exceeds the lot limit the judge of that show will make a decision based on market standards.

- ***For the 2014 sale there will NOT be a limit on swine. This is due to the discovery of PEDv and the decision to make the swine show terminal. All swine exhibitors will be able to sell one pig in the sale.***
- If an exhibitor is disqualified in any show due to cheating, misconduct, etc. they will not be allowed to sell.
- All exhibitors are expected to market their animal to potential buyers and invite them to come to the auction.
- 10. All exhibitors must display a thank you card next to their identification/barn card. Cards will be provided. All other forms of thanks are up to the exhibitor.
- 11. All exhibitors selling at the sale will be expected to certify that the animals being sold are drug free at the date of sale. This is a regulation with state and federal laws regarding meat animals. Drug free forms will be provided at the check in site.
- 12. If an animal is deemed unhealthy or unfit to sell will not be allowed to sell. The final decision will be made by a staff veterinarian.
- 13. Each exhibitor will be expected to sign an affidavit stating that the animal originated in the United States of America.
- 14. The Stoughton Jr. Fair Meat Animal Sale Committee reserves the right to interpret and enforce the rules and regulations, accept or reject any entry entirely, partially or conditionally.

Small Animal Sale - Rabbits, Poultry and Fowl

- 15. All exhibitors selling under the Small Animal Auction will be expected to dress and deliver the animal, if requested to do so, by the buyer within 2 weeks of the Stoughton Jr. Fair. Exhibitors must include their name, full address and final dressed weight along with "Not Inspected" on the outside of the package before delivering dressed rabbits and poultry to the buyer.
- 16. Animals must meet current industry standards based on quality and weight. The following rules will be used as guidelines for the sale.

Chickens 3-5 lbs. for broilers, 7-10 lbs. for roasters **Rabbits** 3-5 lbs.

Large Animal Sale - Beef, Swine and Sheep
